Resource Referrals for Cardiovascular Disease 486

Primary care practice facilitators played an important role in a population health improvement effort focused on connecting patients to community resources for cardiovascular disease prevention.

PCMH Activities With Low Spending 503

Of 22 components of a PCMH model, 6 were associated with lower spending or utilization in Medicare's 1st medical home demonstration, the Multi-Payer Advanced Primary Care Practice demonstration (2011-2014).

Potentially Preventable Hospitalization 511

While potentially preventable hospitalizations rates did not change overall in the majority of US counties in 2010-2014, dually eligible, Black, and Hispanic patients continued to have substantially higher PPH rates compared with non—dually eligible and White patients, respectively.

Hearing Loss Screening in Primary Care 520

The EAR-PC study showed for the first time that electronic prompts are effective in increasing referrals for audiologic testing in patients at risk for hearing loss (age 55 and older).

Insurance and Gender-Affirming Hormones 528
