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Supplemental Appendix 2. Patient Interview Guide: An Ethnographic Investigation into the Impact of Information Technology in a Family Medicine Clinical Practice

Note: Tailor this interview somewhat to reflect what the observer saw during the clinical encounter. Following the general question, refer specifically to what occurred, as appropriate.

1. How did you feel about having me observe your visit with your doctor?
2. Was this your regular primary care doctor?
 - a. If not: How often have you seen this particular doctor before?
3. How do you think your visit with the doctor went?
 - a. Was there anything especially different about this visit from your other visits with this doctor?
4. How would you describe the doctor's style of talking to you?
5. What did you think about the doctor's style of talking with you?
 - a. Did you feel you could ask questions if you wanted to?
 - b. Did you get information about things you were concerned about?
6. Is your doctor using an electronic health record for you?
7. Tell me about how the doctor recorded notes during your visit.
 - a. Did the doctor record information about you during the visit?
 - b. How did the doctor do this?
 - i. Writing in a chart?
 - ii. Typing on a computer?
 - c. About how much of the time do you feel the doctor spent looking at you and talking?
 - i. About how much of the time did he/she spend recording notes?
 - d. How did you feel while the doctor was recording notes?
8. [If used computer for medical record]: Did the doctor use the computer for anything besides typing notes?
[If did not use computer for medical record]: Did the doctor use a computer for anything during your visit?
 - a. If yes:
 - i. What did the doctor do on the computer?
 - ii. How did you feel about the doctor using a computer during your visit?
 - iii. Did you feel that you could look at the screen while the doctor was working on the computer? (Probe.)

11. Would you be interested in being able to access your own medical record (your Personal Health Information record) via a computer you use at home or somewhere else?

 - ii. What information would you want to see?
 - iii. How would having that information help you?

Wrap-up questions: We're just about finished with the interview. I'd just like to ask a few questions about you.

- 1. What is the highest grade of schooling, or highest degree that you have?
- 2. What ethnic group do you identify with?
- 3. Do you use a computer at home or at work or anywhere else? (If yes, probe about where, and for what purposes.)
- 4. Great, thank you. Is there anything else you would like to tell me about the visit with the doctor you just had?
